A BRIEF INTRODUCTION TO THE 2023 EDITION

In ministry, it's easy to let the urgent keep you from the important.

How many times have you started a week with intentionality, only to reach the week feeling unaccomplished and still unprepared for Sunday?

These simple pages can help prevent that. There's one page for each week of the year, with plenty of space for you to focus in on what matters and insights about what's coming in your church. You'll learn a little but plan a lot.

Here's a quick rundown of each section:

KEY TAKEAWAY: This is a simple place for you to reflect on the last week and capture a lesson learned.

THREE OUTCOMES: When you get to the end of the week, what results do you want to celebrate? Outcomes aren't tasks; they are achievements.

ACTION ITEMS: Jot down a few key tasks for the week, making sure they are connected to the desired outcomes.

PEOPLE: Remember, ministry is about people so ask God to bring three relationships to mind.

THINK ABOUT THIS: This short challenge is time-sensitive. It's meant to let you know what's coming and give you something important to work on.

VERSE OF THE WEEK: Think and meditate on this verse as you move throughout your week.

Each page of The Pastor's Planner is similar, but you'll notice timely advice matched to the season of ministry in your church. Print the entire packet or just the relevant page. Either way, 15-30 minutes of focus can really help you focus on what's most important in your ministry.

A study a few years ago by the reading subscription service, Scribd, showed that 35% of Americans wish they could read more. If you're in that statistic, the second week of the year is the perfect time to create a reading list for the year.

You might want to think strategically about areas of growth or things you want to learn, rather than just buying whatever is popular or what other people recommend. And if reading isn't your thing, audio books are great.

THINK **ABOUT THIS**



Moving forward, especially during tough times, requires a growth mindset. Harvard Business Review puts it this way:

"Individuals who believe their talents can be developed (through hard work, good strategies, and input from others) have a growth mindset."

For church leaders, it might look like this: the leaders who have a growth mindset (instead of a "stuck" or "fixed" mindset) don't use circumstances, limits, or a shifting culture as an excuse not to lead, grow, or try new things. They look inward first, examining their own character and circle of influence, and focus on the resources they have. Then they adapt to lead in a way that overcomes external challenges.

Depending on the day, your audience might be your church staff, your congregation, or your family. When you're a speaker or leader (or both), it seldom matters who you're talking to—you have to muster plenty of courage and continue to work on your communication skills.

THINK ABOUT THIS



If there's drama, conflict, or issues to solve, they usually revolve around a "what"— what someone said or didn't say, what topic the sermon should be on, what type of outreach to do for the upcoming holiday. But developing people—the "who" of your church—matters more than the "what." Why?

- People are more important than programs and projects.
- You're called to equip the saints for the work of ministry (Ephesians 4).
- Ministries without leaders won't have the impact you want to see.

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VERSE OF THE WEEK: PROVERBS 21:2

THINK ABOUT THIS



There's a fine line between letting the culture rule your church and utilizing ideas from popular culture to connect with your church. We've said it before: the best leaders can learn from anyone. And wherever you look—whether it's to the latest viral TikTok video or the TV show that people in your congregation can't stop talking about—you're likely to find some truth, help, and ideas.

Which parts of culture are your people really into right now? What can you learn from it? If it's unhealthy, what can you gather about why it appeals to them and how you can guide them in the right direction? If it's healthy, how can you apply it to help them connect with God and Scripture?



DAYLIGHT SAVINGS TIME BEGINS

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VERSE OF THE WEEK: PHILIPPIANS 4:9

"Whatever you have learned or received or heard from me, or seen in me put it into practice. And the God of peace will be with you."

THINK **ABOUT THIS**



In 2011, psychologists EJ Masicampo and RF Baumeister did a study concluding that "committing to a specific plan for a goal may therefore not only facilitate attainment of the goal, but may also free cognitive resources for other pursuits."

Translation: Plans eat goals for breakfast, and your best bet for seeing growth in your goals and having more capacity to pursue other goals is to make a plan.

If you're not sure where to start, break your big goal up into small pieces. Those are your milestones. Attach dates to them and go for it.

Goals are also a great way to manage people. Ask your team "what are your goals for your ministry, small group, or endeavor?" Then come alongside them to help them reach those goals.

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VERSE OF THE WEEK: 2 THESSALONIANS 3:16

"Now may the Lord of peace himself give you peace at all times and in every way. The Lord be with all of you."

THINK ABOUT THIS



Easter is coming up in three weeks. Do you know what your outreach plans are? If your response is, "Plans? What plans?" use the list below to help you get started. Jot down a few ideas and take it to your team to get Easter planning underway.

- Outreach plan.
 Will you do any community events or initiatives? Think Easter egg hunts or door hangers.
- Sermon plan. What angle will you use in your <u>Easter sermon</u>? Do you need any special illustrations?
- Service plan. What is the order of service for Easter Sunday? Will you use any additional resources? Consider post-service food or a <u>photobooth</u> in the lobby.
- Follow-up plan.
 How will you follow up with guests who attended Easter services and help them get connected to the church?

Any therapist will tell you that it's much easier to blame outside forces for our issues instead of looking inside at ourselves. The same goes for barriers that can keep a church from growing.

THINK ABOUT THIS



Every church—yes, even the largest you can think of—is always in need of more volunteers.

Most likely, the way you "do church" and the needs of your congregation have changed over the years. And with it, volunteer roles should also be refreshed.

How can you create new places for people to serve? First, look for gaps:

- Where do you need the most help?
- How can you create specific roles for new people to step into?
- Are there people serving in outdated volunteer roles that no longer serve the church's mission?
- Can you shift people into a new role that matches both their gifts and the church's needs?





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VERSE OF THE WEEK: ROMANS 12:10

"Be devoted to one another in love. Honor one another above yourselves."

Eugene Peterson once wrote:

"The most important thing a pastor does is stand in a pulpit every Sunday and say, 'Let us worship God.' If that ceases to be the primary thing I do in terms of my energy, my imagination, and the way I structure my life, then I no longer function as a pastor."

You get pulled in many different directions as a pastor. Your tasks are varied and seemingly endless. It probably seems like everyone and everything is fighting for your attention.

As you fulfill your pastoral duties, know that you're going in the right direction so long as you remember to lead yourself and your people to the most important One: "Let us worship God."





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VERSE OF THE WEEK: ROMANS 12:1

"Therefore, I urge you, brothers and sisters, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God—this is your true and proper worship."





Struggling to get people to say yes to anything from leading small groups to planning events? Try taking the pressure off by delegating co-leaders.

In the same way that giving end dates to some volunteer roles makes people feel more comfortable stepping up, having a backup leader encourages people to serve because they know they're not in it alone.

Next time your church needs people to sign up for various opportunities, stress that they'll have support and won't be alone in their "yes."





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VERSE OF THE WEEK: 1 JOHN 4:12

"No one has ever seen God; but if we love one another, God lives in us and his love is made complete in us."





If you've been pastoring for any amount of time, you know that it's not all sunshine and smiles. Sometimes, you're walking alongside people in the most joyous moments of their lives, like babies being born and marriages being reconciled.

But there are other times when you have to walk people through grief. It may be with individuals (in times of death and relationship turmoil) or with the entire community (in times of pandemic or a local tragedy).

THINK **ABOUT THIS**



The image that many people have of their pastor is someone holed up in an office with walls full of books, studying complex biblical concepts for 12 hours per day. But what some fail to see is the pastor as a person who probably listens to podcasts, prays simple prayers, and watches some of the same TV shows they love.

You'd be surprised how many people would be interested in knowing what their pastor is reading, watching, and listening to.

Use this to connect with people in conversations, from the pulpit, and on social media. You could even start a newsletter to share what you're enjoying and help your people grow in the same ways you like to learn.

THINK ABOUT THIS



Have you ever wondered what's stopping people from volunteering?
Sometimes people (incorrectly) assume they don't have anything to offer their church.

Break down the ways people can serve and share it to encourage them. Some people are good at working with their hands—what can they help create or build? Others can serve with their minds—could they help with sermon research, technology, or proofreading?

With various opportunities to serve and the diverse talents that are undoubtedly represented in your congregation, there's a place for everyone to serve.





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VERSE OF THE WEEK: 1 JOHN 3:1

"See what great love the Father has lavished on us, that we should be called children of God!"





It's almost time to recognize the dads! Like Mother's Day, Father's Day can be an opportunity for outreach, celebration, and care. And it's in two weeks.

How can you acknowledge the hardworking, servant-hearted fathers in your midst and those who fill important fatherly discipleship roles for people in the church?

The thought of a ministry plan overwhelms many pastors, and rightfully so. Ministry plans of the past could be complicated, 60-page documents that caused confusion instead of providing clarity.

Zoom out from that type of ministry plan and start simple. Begin with step one: creating your church's purpose, mission, and vision statements (check out these purpose statement examples).

Ultimately, your ministry plan should help clarify what your church does and why. It should simplify what you do and assign responsibilities to make sure that you're not doing it alone.

THINK ABOUT THIS



The reason many people hesitate to volunteer at their church boils down to a lack of clarity. They don't know what the role does, and they don't know what's required or expected of them.

Consider creating job descriptions for your church's volunteers similar to the type of job description you'd create for a paid staff member.

Include:

- The role's title (for example, "5th Grade Small Group Leader")
- A description of the role's purpose
- When and where they serve
- The time commitment (for example, "two Sundays per month, 2.5 hours each")
- How long the commitment lasts
- Who to talk to if they have questions or issues

Emails often get ignored because they're repetitive, sharing the same information and announcements every single week. But with a little strategy, email is a powerful tool for connecting with people and helping them grow in their faith.

You may have a church newsletter or digital bulletin, but try a different approach. Instead of blasting information, send authentic notes and helpful content such as, "Three Ways to Meet New People at Church" or "How to Make the Most of Work."

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VERSE OF THE WEEK: ROMANS 8:1

THINK ABOUT THIS



As a church leader, you've likely wanted to shout, "Everybody's a critic!" at least once.

In their book, *Pastors* and *Their Critics*, Nick Thompson and Joel Beeke write:

"Only when we understand criticism as the Lord's sanctifying tool will we learn lessons our critics didn't intend."

Isn't that a beautiful reminder of the proper place for healthy, constructive criticism?

It can be easy to get burned out on everyone's criticism and opinions, but remember—whether it's from a senior leader's rebuke or a tough conversation with a volunteer—God can use it to grow both you and the church.

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VERSE OF THE WEEK: 1 PETER 4:10

"Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms."

THINK ABOUT THIS



Wondering how to make the most of your summer? Start with this list.

- Invest in relationships. Summer is a great time to say thanks by inviting people over for a cookout or some other fun, relationship-building activity.
- Pause preaching.

 If you're the main preacher, summer is perfect for scheduling a few weeks away from the stage. Call in other leaders or guest speakers if you can.
- Plan for fall. Get started on your preaching calendar, special event plans, and year-end campaign in advance of the busy fall ministry season.

THINK ABOUT THIS



Research by Barna from 2020 showed that the top two aspects that congregants missed about in-person church services were taking communion/Eucharist and socializing with others before or after services.

What does that mean for leaders?

It means you should make a big deal about community.

Share stories of how church members formed deep friendships in unexpected circumstances or provided care that can't be found online. Speak earnestly and often about what communion means for the body of Christ as a whole. Use what we know about why people attend church to help them stay connected.

VERSE OF THE WEEK: 2 CORINTHIANS 4:15

"All this is for your benefit, so that the grace that is reaching more and more people may cause thanksgiving to overflow to the glory of God."

THINK ABOUT THIS



There is a power within a handwritten thank you note that an email simply can't emulate. They are not only an excuse to make use of fancy stationery, but are also a memorable, personal, and simple way to acknowledge people.

This week, think of people you normally wouldn't—the teenage child of your executive pastor, the church janitor and their spouse, the person who delivers pizza to the youth group every Thursday night, the company that prints the weekly bulletins. Make an effort to write them a thank you note. Even a short one will do.



3 MOST IMPORTANT OUTCOMES FOR THIS WEEK

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VERSE OF THE WEEK: ROMANS 10:14

"How, then, can they call on the one they have not believed in? And how can they believe in the one of whom they have not heard? And how can they hear without someone preaching to them?"

THINK ABOUT THIS



One often forgotten action that can contribute to church growth is participating in partnerships—not only with other churches, but also with community organizations, schools, etc.

How can your church help? How can you let the frequently underfunded nonprofits and schools in your area know that you're there for them?

Consider a campaign to fill backpacks with school supplies or sending a representative to engage in meetings about community concerns.

It's amazing how many relationships you can form and potentially connect to your church just by having an intentional presence in your community.
